

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR & CEO

It's been 10 years since the Bermuda Foundation began its work to build a community asset to support the nonprofit sector. Our arrival coincided with a decade of global crises and disasters of every kind imaginable: political, financial, racial, social, health (including, but not limited to, pandemic), and brutal wars. Remote as our islands are, we all know they are far from isolated, and these major disruptions did not leave Bermuda untouched. Many in our own community have been directly and harshly affected by the fallout—and that has an impact on us all.

Inevitably, crises hit hardest where they cause most hurt. They affect the vulnerable, those who are un-cushioned by wealth, in poor health or disadvantaged by myriad circumstances. More speedily than anticipated, our newborn Foundation found it had a significant part to play in helping to meet some immediate needs. Our role included generating specific funding support, assisting nonprofits to expand their capacity to meet the torrent of additional demands they faced, and bringing nonprofit service providers together to identify priorities and work together to tackle problems bigger than any single one of us could resolve.

Many donors—corporate and individual philanthropists continue to show up to help; it's the Bermuda way. But we believe that at this moment in time, more is required.

We don't just mean more resources—for there will always be critical needs—but we are talking about a focus on increasing community assets that will stand the test of time and will be protected for the long term. Yes, we have current day issues to work on—but as a community foundation we cannot be effective if we don't build assets for the future. The third sector needs to thrive if Bermuda is to thrive, and to do that nonprofits will need to be empowered to move on from their current handto-mouth existence.

Only then will they have the ability to focus more energy on providing their important services, and less on frantic fund-raising.

Bermuda has been so fortunate to be the beneficiary of so much generosity over the past several decades. Thank

you, a thousand times over. But now we are asking you, philanthropists, to consider directing a portion of your resources towards work that will be carried out beyond us and our times, potentially even beyond our specific interests. In fact, it would constitute the ultimate in philanthropy, the epitome of contributions for the public good.

Yes, much of the responsibility for implementing solutions that address social ills, poverty, housing, access to education, and public health, resides traditionally with a government. But we all know that with its own significant financial constraints and list of competing priorities, our government needs the support of the nonprofit community. How would our community have survived the Covid-19 pandemic without the extraordinary support of our nonprofits?

To prepare for the future, together we need a community asset from which profits can be deployed to solve complex social problems as well as day-to-day needs. In the future the community will likely be facing social issues we haven't even yet envisioned.

We need to be ready. In our view, the community foundation model is the ideal structure to manage this plan for the future. We need to continue to grow this community asset.

To quote one donor advocate: "In creating a charitable endowment, we turn our wealth into a tool for good, ensuring that our resources contribute to positive change and address the evolving needs of our community."

In the words of a major philanthropist: "Leaving a legacy is a way of saying 'I was here, and I cared enough to make a difference that will outlive me'."

Today we are here and we care—enough to want to make a difference. Join us in creating a permanent source of funds, for Bermuda, forever.

ABOUT US

The purpose of the Bermuda Foundation (BF) is to build and manage funds that will sustain the nonprofit sector long term and to inspire philanthropy for social impact.

The nonprofit sector plays a crucial role in Bermuda, providing essential services in education, social welfare, health, sport, the environment, and the arts. Bermuda cannot afford to lose the services provided by its nonprofits.

Building a permanent endowment is central to addressing the needs of the community. Given that those needs will change over the years, the fund has been created with the flexibility to adapt to community priorities.

BF also enables corporations, individuals, and families to establish customised charitable funds, reducing the cost

and infrastructure of setting up a private foundation or trust. We assist donors to realise their philanthropic vision and create funds to support causes important to them. Permanent donors' funds are aggregated, invested and managed to achieve greater returns on investments.

To fulfill our mission to create an enduring source of funds forever dedicated to the good of Bermuda, we direct our efforts and dollars to priority community issues with the long-term aim of providing sustainable and enduring solutions. Through nonprofit partnerships, we support leadership development to strengthen local nonprofits and community groups.

We do this with integrity and respect for all involved and aspire to meet the highest standards of excellence.

OUR IMPACT AS A COMMUNITY OF DONORS

BF's grantmaking programmes are supported by a community of unrelated donors who wish to ensure the success and/or sustainability of nonprofits in Bermuda by creating endowment funds. These donors use the resources and expertise of BF to support their grantmaking in specific fields or general philanthropic interests that span all areas of the sector. Some of these donors are private individuals or entities who chose to keep a low profile on the scope and details of their giving. These donors' gifts, combined with the BF's unrestricted funding contributions of almost \$300,000, resulted in competitive* grants to nonprofits delivering programmes. Grants from the combined funds totalled over \$5 million. Through the multiple donor-advised competitive grants programmes, BF reviewed over 100 grant applications. Funding was directed in the following ways:

I. Consider your charitable interests

2. Establish your fund

It's easy to establish your own Donor-advised (Fund) at Bermuda Foundation. With a gift of \$25,000, a personally-named fund can be set up in just a day or two. The fund's capital is endowed and only the income is granted out, so the fund keeps on giving, year after year.

3. Grant from your fund

With a fund, you can have as little or as much involvement as you want. You can support any Bermudaregistered charity, or you can focus on a charitable cause and leave the decision making to our advisors who will facilitate support to nonprofit projects on your behalf.

4. Plan for the future

Planning for the future is important, as your fund is a lasting legacy that will continue to support the community for generations. You can appoint a trusted friend or family member as your successor fund advisor, or ask Bermuda Foundation to carry out your wishes in perpetuity.

Establish an Agency Fund

We don't just work with individual and family donors. In fact, Bermuda Foundation manages endowment funds on behalf of several charitable agencies. A charitable agency endowment fund provides for prudent capital growth coupled with a predictable source of income, which is particularly helpful in years where donations are down or government funding is reduced.
